Lily's new journey

In your last Pupdate, Lily's trainer Kirsty talked about the new skills she was working on with Lily to help progress her guide dog training. She also described the ongoing challenges that Lily was experiencing, including body sensitivity and a lack of motivation when learning new skills. Whilst Kirsty worked hard to help Lily overcome these challenges, it was eventually decided that, with Lily's welfare and the safety of a potential guide dog owner in mind, Lily would be better suited to a career as a buddy dog.

Buddy dogs

Buddy dogs are life-changing companions for children and young people with visual impairments. They provide valuable emotional support and help to increase confidence and independence. Buddy dogs do not aid mobility in the same way that guide dogs do, but the impact that they have on the families that they partner with is incredible.

Although buddy dogs often wear a coat to identify them as a buddy dog, this is not essential to their role in the same way that a guiding harness would be to a guide dog.

Assessing Lily

Before accepting Lily into the buddy dog programme, it was important to ensure that she would be comfortable, be happy and thrive in this role. Lily attended an experience session with me so that I could assess how she interacts with children. During the session, a family on our applicant list visited the centre. They were introduced to Lily and given the opportunity to spend some time playing with her as well as learning about dog care.

I'm pleased to share that Lily was a super star! Her affectionate personality and calm temperament will make her a perfect buddy dog. During the experience session, she engaged well with the children, and when they threw her ball for her, she retrieved it and returned it directly to them. She was incredibly gentle when taking treats from them and not too boisterous when playing. I was also impressed with how well Lily seemed to be able to read the situation and respond appropriately; she knew when it was time to play, and when it was time to settle.


A future family

What's next?

I'm now working to find the perfect family to match with Lily. Each potential family will have a home check to ensure the environment is suitable for a buddy dog, and they will attend experience sessions and online webinars to ensure that they are prepared for a dog to join their family. Lily will be introduced to her potential match and, if successful, she will begin a fourweek trial period to ensure that there are no concerns, after which Lily will officially qualify as a buddy dog. I'm confident that Lily will thrive in her new role and I can't wait to update you in your February Pupdate.





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
